

Electronic Publication Survey Results

he Electronic Publication survey was conducted recently using Survey Monkey The response rate was approximately 13.8%, or 79 responses. The survey was conducted in order to determine members' preferences in publication formats. Currently the AAC publishes this newsletter electronically, the Bulletin three times a year in a printed format and Special Publications, including conference proceedings, in printed format.

Due to the cost of printed publications, the AAC is considering changing all publications to electronic format. However, before proceeding in our deliberations we wanted to ask members for their input.

The following is a summary of responses. Please contact the AAC office if you would like a more detailed summary of the survey responses.

- 56% of members responding currently subscribe to electronic publications
- 50% of members responding currently regularly read the AAC's printed publications; 43.6% read sometimes; 6.4% rarely read the printed publications or not at all.
- 50% of members responding currently regularly read the AAC's Watermark; 30.8% read sometimes; 19.2% rarely read the Watermark or not at all.

We then asked members if they would be more or less inclined to read AAC's print publications if they were changed from print to electronic format. The responses were:

A lot more inclined	11.5%
Somewhat more inclined	19.2%
The same	42.3%

Somewhat less inclined Less inclined

16.7% 10.3%

AAC: Where did you grow up?

I was born in Winnipeg, Manitoba. I really grew up while doing my Bachelor of Science in Aquaculture at Malaspina University (now Vancouver Island University).

AAC: Why did you choose the field of aquaculture?

I was always interested in fish. Pursuing a biology degree I had the opportunity to work in environmental science with DFO. I came across some aquaculture books at the DFO library that really ignited my interest in aquaculture. Aquaculture strikes a great balance for my interests in biology and business.

AAC: Who mentored you in the industry?

There are so many great people that have welcomed me and made me feel comfortable. One that immediately comes to mind is Joy Wade.

AAC: What is your area of specialty?

Although "specialist" is in my title, I feel I need to be more of a generalist that can help others in all aspects of aquaculture. With that said, I have focused a lot of my time on understanding land-based recirculation aquaculture technology.

AAC: What parallels would you draw between the agriculture and aquaculture industries?

Working for Manitoba Agriculture, Food and Rural Initiatives, I get a close up look at the agriculture industry. To me, aquaculture is agriculture so the parallels are endless. Both are dedicated to providing high quality food products and must do so by operating according to sound business principles.

AAC: What is the biggest issue facing Aquaculture in Canada today?

In my opinion, attracting investment to the industry is the biggest issue. The potential for aquaculture development in Canada is enormous. Creating a positive investment climate is no easy task. Demonstrating commercial success and establishing legislative and regulatory environments that are clear and fair would go a long way towards improving the investment climate for aquaculture in Canada.

AAC: Manitoba is not a big aquaculture producing province. What do you see as the future of aquaculture in your province?

I see the future of a sustainable aquaculture industry in Manitoba being based on clusters of land-based operations that are supported by other businesses involved in the supply chain. Manitoba has many advantages for developing aquaculture including farming expertise, latent infrastructure that could be converted to aquaculture facilities and an abundance of high quality freshwater.

AAC: What do you see as the number one myth about aquaculture?

That it is intrinsically bad. I actually hear people say "Aquaculture? Isn't that bad?" The public is very confused by all the bad press out there on aquaculture. Being a newer industry compared to most in Canada, aquaculture seems to suffer from the post-ecological revolution syndrome in which industries face heavy, unfounded criticism for their environmental performance. When in reality, generally speaking aquaculture is а very environmentally responsible industry because it relies on maintaining healthy ecosystems to support its very own existence.

AAC: Why did you become a member of AAC?

I first joined AAC as a student to get a blinders-off look at everything going on out there in the world of aquaculture. I strongly believe that that it is very important to engage fully in the industry you are involved with if you want to have success.

AAC: What benefit of membership do you value most?

I still benefit greatly from reading all the publications that come along with being a member of AAC. When I can (seems to be every second year) I really benefit from attending the annual conference.

AAC: What is your favourite seafood dish?

Oysters on the half shell

AAC: What hidden talent do you possess?
